

As many of you know, we have recently started a new site in Southern Ohio with Chance Cooper leading the way. Please read what he wrote below as he shares about the difference the teams who come to serve alongside the ministry of ARO will make in Southern Ohio.

First, thank you for taking an interest in Appalachia Reach Out and the work we are doing across Appalachia. I understand that when we hear Appalachia, often, we think of bibbed overalls and dirt floors tucked back into the hills. Partly, you would be correct; you can find that where we call home. What you will find more, is a people who work hard and love well, but live under a glass ceiling of poverty. To us, poverty is more than the number that is assigned to someone who is poor. Poverty is often a lifestyle of choices both personal and generational. Understanding that circumstances happen completely out of our control that can drastically change our way of life. Sometimes economic challenges, addiction, trauma, or simple bad choices leave our community in great need of Christ's love, grace, and mercy. The type of Love that loves you just the way you are, but far too much to leave you that way. We could take a "Poor Tour" and show you everything that probably comes to mind when you hear the word Appalachia. Rather, our heart is that your eyes would be opened to the hurting community and often hopeless eyes that we meet before us around every corner.

At ARO, our mission is to alleviate poverty through Christ's Love in Action. In Southern Ohio, much like our other sites, that word Action is what can change and look differently with our short-term mission teams. That might look like doing home remodeling or construction projects, sorting donations, spending time at our recovery meeting, loving on students in one of our local schools, or sharing conversation at one of our addiction treatment facilities. What does not change is the relationships built and the dignity restored to a community desperately lost. We work hard to partner with local organizations to share in creating the greatest impact. Anywhere that our short-term mission teams serve will always be somewhere that our team is working 365 to foster relationships and introduce the authentic love of Christ. Why do we engage in a ministry that sometimes feels like we are pushing water up hill? Short answer, as the Director of our Southern Ohio site, I am a direct result of the undeserved, unwavering, overwhelming love of the Christ in action. As a firstgeneration Christian who comes from all the brokenness that I have described, without a single doubt, there is hope in the work that we do. My story is not unlike so many other testimonies of grace and life change that we hear through our work with ARO. Everyone is being led in a direction and we actively choose to lead them to Jesus. We believe that as we reach the community with helping hands to lift them up, people's lives can be changed, and the bondage of poverty broken. Much like the Samaritan we read of in Luke 10, we hope to follow Christ command, "Go and do likewise." We understand, breaking from the bondage of poverty does not happen overnight. Our prayer is that through Christ we may be the neighbors we are called to be in the communities we serve.

Thank you for taking the time to read from my heart. If you have any questions or I can help in anyway, please do not hesitate to reach out. Keep my family in your prayers as we engage in this work, and we continue to pray for everyone who has a heart to be Christ Love in Action.
